## Bear Creek High School contributes to the Nature Center

Students from Bear Creek High School's AP and CP Environmental Science classes are working on a project at the Nature Center. As an extension of the Native Plant Garden, a new section representing the Foothill plant communities is being developed by them for us. With the help of their instructor Isabel Cuerpo, docent Steve Stocking and Nature Center

Coordinator James Rexroth, the students are learning about the foothill environment, researching plant communities, developing planting plans and planting and caring for the plants.

On November 22 they put all the pieces together and planted the mounds between the entry road and the existing Native Plant Garden. James acquired plants from Hartland Nursery and Annie's Annuals based on the students lists and they laid the plants out according to the plans they developed. After a few minor adjustments they proceeded to plant. It was quite a sight seeing the students working together and accomplishing this task. They will continue to come out to help care for the

plants and planting additional plants (not all plants on the lists were available now) in the future. We look forward to their continued support for the Nature Center and the development of community spirit in their lives.

## Special Focus—Northern Flicker

The Northern Flicker (*Colaptes auratus*) is a large brownish woodpecker often seen feeding on ants on the ground. As it flies away from you, you'll notice the large white rump and a flash of red under the wings that clearly means you're seeing a Flicker.

The Northern Flicker has two distinct forms, the 'Red-shafted' and 'Yellow-shafted'. The Red-shafted Flicker is the western form which is seen most often in our area. Their numbers increase in the fall as individuals come down out of the mountains to winter in the

valley. A few pairs remain here in the spring to nest.

The Flicker was an important bird to most of the native peoples of California. The red feather shafts were used in the making of ceremonial costumes that were important to their religious ceremonies.


## Oak Grove Docent Council's Holiday Potluck Get Together Thursday, Dec. 4th at 6 PM
